#### **PROVINCIAL'S MESSAGE**

Walking in the Footsteps of Faith: Prophets and Pilgrims of the Precious Blood Community

Our Precious Blood forefathers— Francesco Albertini, St. Gaspar del Bufalo, Biagio Valentini, Blessed Giovanni Merlini—along with the holy men from each province, have left us examples of how to live as both prophets and pilgrims.

Gaspar's brave step of faith in trusting in Albertini's vision of founding a community dedicated to preaching the saving gift of life through the Precious Blood of Christ is deeply inspiring. Valentini and Merlini, among others, joined this mission, governing and continuing the work of our founding fathers. These men shared virtues that we can still imitate today.

God looks at our hearts, not our accomplishments. Merlini modeled the teachings of Jesus and faithfully followed the Rule established by St. Gaspar. What did Gaspar see in Merlini, and what did Merlini see in Gaspar—or in the community living in Giano—that led him to return and join this community of preachers?

Merlini's **humility** is a key aspect of his life. He welcomed the invitation to be a missionary of the Word, embracing God's plan as he lived His will throughout his many commitments. He dedicated each day to fulfilling God's will and bore witness to the love of the Father, in the spirit of the Blood of the Son, who came to redeem the world.

Merlini's **simplicity** is another defining trait. He found contentment and peace, trusting that God would lead the community where it needed to go. His focus was on seeking the true path of holiness, living with love, and offering witness to the work of each day. He accepted his limitations and frailties, walking alongside others and

reflecting God's presence. He allowed himself to be absorbed by Him.

Merlini's **righteousness** came through his simplicity. He lived a rational, practical life, always aligning himself with Christ's spirit and nurturing his relationship with God. His dedication to the "inner room" of his heart, celebrating the Eucharist, and dear devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary show us that holiness is born from humility and accepting God's plan for us.

Our forefathers teach us much about faith and living together as brothers. God speaks to us each day. Speaking to God through prayer is beautiful, but it is equally important to listen in silence and accept what we hear. Silence is a way to understand and surrender our desires to God's purpose, for His ways far surpass our own. In letting go, we show trust in our Father, even when life seems chaotic.

Finally, there are men in our community (our province) who continue to teach us

how to trust and believe. Trusting that God is with us so we need not fear, and believing that God loves us enough to give His Son to die and shed His Precious Blood so we may have new life. We are called to believe with trust and joy, responding with charity through our works, serving those around us, and respecting one another as brothers.

God's will is lived through humility, simplicity, and righteousness. As pilgrims, we are invited to trust and believe, nourishing our hope. In doing so, we give prophetic witness to His



will. In this Jubilee Year of Hope, let us strive to be both prophets and pilgrims, keeping hope alive.

## REFLECTION ON THE JUBILEE YEAR OF HOPE

Every 25 years, the Pope declares a Year of Jubilee, encompassing a yearlong celebration in the Church that focuses on the remissions of sins, reconciliation, conversion, evangelization, and spiritual renewal. Each Jubilee Year also adopts a specific theme. However, Popes can also declare Extraordinary Jubilees for special occasions. For example, in 2015, Pope Francis declared a Jubilee for the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of the Second Vatican Council. In 1983, Pope John Paul II proclaimed a Jubilee to celebrate the 1950<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the death and resurrection of Jesus. The fundamental idea of the Church's declaration of a Jubilee Year is rooted in Jewish tradition and is based on Leviticus 25:10, which states that the  $50^{th}$  year shall be proclaimed as a remission of sin to all the inhabitants of the land...for this is the Year of Jubilee.

After the year 1450, the Church decreed that the Jubilee should be every 25 years. In his Jubilee Bull of Indiction, Pope Francis declared 2025 as the Year of Hope. The Bull of Indiction is simply a Papal document that announce a Jubilee and offers a reflection on the theme for that year.

In his Bull, Pope Francis writes: "Everyone knows what it is to hope.

Hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come despite our not knowing what the future may bring." I

don't know what my future may bring, but I have been privileged to live through five Jubilee Years, and I hope that I can live long enough to perhaps experience one or two more. This is just one example of how hope can offer someone something to hold onto, to give one a sense of optimism, to ground hope in our belief that the love of Christ promises us eternal life.

This hope is a virtue that I see and experience each day in various aspects of my life. Every morning, I can choose to scrutinize this world—a world which is marked by suffering, injustice, and brokenness—and feel hopeless. Or, I can rest on the assurance that God is actively working to redeem and restore His creation; a work revealed through salvation history and culminated through the redemptive work of Jesus. Instead of feeling dejected by death, mourning, pain, and earthly challenges, I can choose to nurture my relationship with Jesus and cultivate hope in the face of tribulation.

When I bear witness to my family drawing closer to God and to the Church, that gives me hope. When I hear non-Christians at work reaching out to God in their own daily struggles, that gives me hope. When people approach me in Church and ask me to bless them because they need to be strengthened amid a crisis, that gives me hope. When I see persecution, war, homelessness, and poverty, I see an opportunity to help those in need, feed the hungry, and give to the poor... and that gives me hope.

During this Jubilee Year, if you find yourself faced with a world of troubles, ask yourself: What gives me hope?

My favorite French philosopher, Gabriel Marcel, wrote: "I almost think that hope is for the soul what breathing is for the living organism. Where hope is lacking,

the soul dries up and withers." Hope is a virtue that is necessary for survival in life. We don't last long or live without it. Without hope, we die physically, emotionally, and spiritually. Living involves hope.

According to the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, Christian hope is "the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit" (CCC 1817).

Throughout my life, hope doesn't disappoint me. To give an example, when I was a kid, I was very sickly, and my parents were so scared that I would not survive. They went on a pilgrimage to the International Shrine of Our Lady of Peace and Good Voyage in Antipolo Rizal, east of Manila, to pray to the Lord through Mary for my healing and survival. Thanks be to God, I survived and was cured.

Another example was when I was assigned in Lima, Peru. The beautiful and joyful pastoral and missionary experience became challenging during the pandemic with so many deaths and suffering people around me in Lima. It became more difficult when I could not travel back to Toronto because of the restrictions My ordination was delayed, and on top of that, I could not even bury my own mother, who passed away in the Philippines in 2020. The hopeless situations became a moment of trust in the Lord's will for me. I learned to entrust my life, my family, my vocation, and so many other people into the hands of Jesus. But God doesn't let me go into despair. Everything turned out very well in God's time. As Romans 5:5 says: "And hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us".

To find hope is to make a lifechanging discovery. It is to connect deeply and personally with the very reason you are here in this world.

In the January issue of 'Bloodlines', Fr. Lui Santi's reflection on 'Learning a New Path', captured Fr. Mario Cafarelli's attention. Fr. Mario writes: 'CULTURE': In a world that is increasingly divided and hostile, it is no small wonder that people long for the "good old days" when life seemed simpler and more meaningful. One element of that sense of comfort and fulfillment was the communal culture shared within a particular society. Culture defines and shapes our being. As a result, it is necessary to put into perspective the reason for such a phenomenon. One's understanding of culture encompasses a wide array of meanings, purposes, identities, expectations, and conformities.

One definition of *culture* refers to the cumulative deposit of knowledge, experience, beliefs, values, attitudes,

meanings, hierarchies, religion, notions of time, and roles, as spatial relations, concepts of the universe, and material objects and possessions acquired by a group of people over generations through individual and group striving.

We live in a world that is witnessing great technological innovations and medical wonders. It also experiences a greater rift between the haves and havenots, devastating climate change, human atrocities, and large-scale extinction. We are experiencing unprecedented migration of people throughout the world. Inevitably, cultures are bound to mingle in ways that can enhance or disrupt the national and social fabric of the receiving country. Culture, therefore, can either define us or set us against one another.

In such a scenario, there is a definite need for enculturation. Wikipedia describes *Enculturation* as the "process by which people learn the dynamics of their surrounding culture and acquire values and norms appropriate or necessary to that culture and its worldview." As much as other cultures can enhance and contribute to a society, it is imperative that it does so in relation to the common or dominant culture of that society.

Mass migration, as in the case of large populations being displaced by economic, political or environmental changes, or individually motivated immigration, can precipitate suspicion and, in severe cases, hostility from the receiving nation or culture. When a culture feels threatened or compromised, it will react in response to those new and incoming cultures. This is not to say that other cultures are insignificant, but that it is important for them to recognize and respect the existing and dominant culture.

Another approach is to incorporate those cultures into a "melting pot" and/or choose those elements that best reflect and envision the ideals of the dominant culture. A third way is to resist any change that can affect the dominant culture.

Today, we are faced with the need to incorporate the migration of people into the ideals and expectations of society. Without this incorporation, society will face division and confusion leading to disenfranchisement and hostility.

Ponder: As missionaries, how do I respect the local culture where I am living and ministering? Am I



incorporating or learning the process of enculturation so that I am able to evangelize well?


